# COURSE DESCRIPTION:

In their essay "Stolen From Our Bodies: First Nations Two-Spirits/Queers and the Journey to a Sovereign Erotic," Cherokee scholar Qwo-Li Driskill positions the Sovereign Erotic as "wholeness healed and / or healing from the historical trauma that First Nations people continue to survive, rooted within the histories, traditions, and resistance struggles of our nations." By creating narratives that centre Indigenous ways of knowing, Indigenous writers, artists, and filmmakers counteract colonial stereotypes. Analyzing how colonization "straightened" Two-Spirit, femmes and women's roles will enable students to understand and appreciate Indigenous peoples' continuing resurgence and resilience. Note: this is a literature and film course, so be prepared to discuss these genres. We will not be positioning Indigenous peoples in a deficit model but rather through a lens of resistance, resilience, and anti-colonialism.
